Therefore, We've organized this public event to consider how best to protect Uganda's parrots and raise awareness about the risks of commercial breeding of parrots and avoiding taking a direction that will land us in the same situation as SA, South Korea and several European countries currently grappling with animals in captivity


Bear farming in South Korea to be outlawed from 1st January 2026. It has been a long a painful journey.

Fur farming for fashion: Today, over 20 countries have banned or partially banned (or are in the process of banning) the industry, or have enacted laws that bring about its end. They include:

Austria, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Belgium, Croatia, The Czech Republic, Estonia, Germany, Hungary, Italy, Japan, Luxemburg, North Macedonia, The Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Serbia, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Switzerland, Sweden and the UK
